SSCW ACTIVITY REPORT SHORT OVERVIEW 2016

Sillamäe Society for Child Welfare's activity in 2016 was divided between 4 fields

- 1. Joining Estonian Union for Child Welfare projects and programs.
- 2. Purposeful project activity
- 3. Cooperation local and international
- 4. Development of organization

Joining Estonian Union for Child Welfare projects and programs.

General purpose of this field is to assist in creating an environment where rights of children are recognized and acknowledged and policies and strategies concerning children set children's needs and interests first.

In 2016 that has included:

- Project "Growing together 2016: work education with children"
- Continuous work in Sillamäe's "Notice the Child" center (incl. playgroup, counselling for parents etc)

Purposeful project activity

Includes short term differently themed activities that are in accordance with the Union's set objectives concerning children and young people.

In 2015 that has included:

- Project "Knowledgeable and tolerant young citizen 2" that introduced to young people their opportunities in getting involved in their communities and the nation and teach them to perfect their ideas and implement them and discussed critically on the topic of Estonian citizenship and propagate open mindedness towards multicultural society among young people and older.
 Project "Co-management Ida-Virumaa 2016" was created by Sillamäe Society for Child
- Project "Co-management Ida-Virumaa 2016" was created by Sillamäe Society for Child Welfare and conducted in cooperation with various local governments, schools and local NGOs in Ida-Virumaa engaging Narva City Government, Toila and Jõhvi county administrative and Kiviõli City Government. The purpose of the project was to advance dialogue between young people and local governments and motivate young people to take an interest and participate in local government's activities.

- Growing together acknowledgeable and strong family in Ida-Viru county" Project's main objective is to propagate work education in cooperation with parents and children through developing the children's skills and giving new information and developing opportunities. Project includes: seminars for parents, youth/children, information campaign and family summer school.
- Civil Society in Estonia: youth is coming 1 and 2 vol. Project "Civil society in Estonia: Youth 1 and 2" saw a same named training series carried out with the ultimate purpose of giving to participants and overview of civil society and the development of civil society in Estonia combining theoretical and practical approaches and demonstrate the practical value of civil society, as well as to give a thorough overview of project management and writing. Theoretical and practical training sessions on the history and practice of Civil Society of Estonia for pupils and students in Tallinn and Ida-Virumaa county schools.

 Gender Empowerment youth programm Project "Gender Empowerment youth program" was a project aimed at young people dealing with gender roles and gender stereotypes. Women are still at a disadvantage in the decision-making procedures, work opportunities, family structures and other important questions. Estonian society is driven by traditional mindset towards gender roles. Project composed of interactive educational activities, an information campaign was carried out and trainings in local schools. Projects main event was final youth conference in Tallinn. Project's purpose was to advance awareness among school age youth about deeply routed gender inequality in everyday social context and the stereotypes and prejudices that feed it, as well as creating means to reduce inequality. To advance discussion on

gender roles and stereotypes, which is necessary to find constructive solutions. To offer gender equality related constructive knowledge and skills in the education system in order to ensure early intervention in the adoption of prejudice and stereotypes. Gender Empowerment Youth programm includes a series of trainings, small research (quistiannaire) and conference as a final event,

• 6. Ida-Virumaa Social Enterprise Forum - Sillamäe Society for Child Welfare together with Social Enterprise Networks and Ida-Virumaa Civil Society Network carried out 25-26.11.2016 Forum caled "Ida-Virumaa competent social service providers" in Tartu University Narva College. Forum was prepared with the help and support of large number of partners. Forum was directed to social service providers in Ida-Virumaa, young entrepreneurs (wishing to begin with social entrepreneurship), NGOs and local government representatives who have an interest in the topic, are considering providing social services or already do.

Cooperation – local and international

General purpose of this field is to advance specialty and organizational cooperation on the local and international level to ensure effectiveness of the organization's activities and connect for partnerships and new ideas.

In 2016 that has included:

- Active work with the Ida-Virumaa county Civil Society Network that was started in 2015 by Sillamäe Society for Child Welfare to develop internal skills of Network members and foster development of the Network through focusing on principals and objectives for the Network www.ivkv.ee.
- Participation in Estonian Civil Society Development Plan joint committee activities (SSCW has been a member in the governmental-NGO committee since 2012).
- Representatives of the Union have participated in several international meetings, conferences and seminars including Estonian-Moldovan development cooperation meeting in Chisinau, May 2016, Anna Lindh Mediterranean Forum 2016 in Valleta, Malta 23-26 October 2016, an international project Euromed: Education without borders (www.euromeduc.com).

Development of organization

Includes development of team and individual capacity in trainings to strengthen the organization.

In 2016 that has included:

- Participation in several trainings and events
- Continuous project writing to international and local application rounds.
- Continuous development of SSCW Children and Youth Aid Foundation, what was started on 12th October 2015 with the purpose of providing scholarships to young people for the development of their individual skills (sports, dancing etc). Note 1 Accounting policies

General information

The financial statements for the year 2016 have been prepared in accordance with good Estonia Accounting practice. The good accounting principles of Estonia are based on internationally recognized accounting and reporting principles, the basic requirements of which are established by the Accounting Act and supplemented by the Accounting Standards Board.

Changes in accounting policies or presentation of information

Comparative data from previous periods has been brought into line with the new approach. In the report The reported annual data is substantially comparable in 2015. Yearly data. Sillamäe Society for Child Welfare. The euro and the annual accounts are drawn up in euros

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash and current account balances, demand deposits and short-term bank deposits in the balance sheet and cash flow statement. The cash flow statement recognizes cash flows from operations in an indirect method. Cash flows from investing and financing activities are recognized directly

Foreign currency transactions and assets and liabilities denominated in a foreign currency

Transactions in foreign currencies and financial assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies Foreign exchange transactions are executed only in euros, if there is a currency in the account, then it will automatically be converted into euros.

Receivables and prepayments

All other receivables are recognized at their adjusted acquisition cost, which is generally equal to their nominal value.

Inventories

The inventory is calculated using the FIFO method. Inventories are valued at the lower of their acquisition cost or net realizable value, whichever is the lower.

Carried At Cost Inventories Accounting Policies

In the Group, tangible fixed assets are tangible assets with a useful life of over one year and with a tax charge of EUR 320.

Tangible fixed assets are recorded at acquisition cost, which consists of the purchase price, non-refundable taxes and directly.
